

Presidential Candidates' Proposals on Public Security

Disarmament Statute

- Reform the Disarmament Statute to **facilitate access to guns**, supporting the widespread possession of fire arms as a deterrent to violence
- Change penal code to guarantee **additional legal protections for those who kill in self-defense**

- **Reinforce the tracking of weapons and ammunition** and improve gun control policy
- **Use intelligence to retrieve weapons** circulating in national and international arms trafficking

Policing

- **Invest in equipment, technology, intelligence, and investigative capacity** of police forces
- Ensure additional **legal protections for policemen** who kill in the line of duty
- Favors strict policing

- **Review the law that created the Single Public Security System (SUSP)** to then implement it, redistributing tasks between municipal, state, and federal governments
- Create a unit within the federal police to **fight organized crime**

Incarceration

- **Reduce the adult prison age to 16**
- Advocates for **strict prison practices**, such as prohibiting temporary releases
- **Introduce harsh penalties for violent crimes as a deterrent to violence**, such as voluntary chemical castration in exchange for a reduced sentence

- Tackle the issue of mass incarceration, particularly of black and marginalized youth, by **providing resources to reduce pressures on the federal prison system**

Other

- Typify **invasions of rural and urban properties** in Brazilian territory as **terrorism**

- Generate work and income for poor young people to **prevent their involvement in violence and illegal markets**
- **Invest in health and education sectors** as a prevention strategy for drug-use
- Invest in the armed forces
- Create a **National Homicide Reduction Plan**
