Martin Tolchin is a senior scholar at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. He is a lifelong journalist and author, capping a forty-year career of covering government and politics for *The New York Times* by founding the Capitol Hill newspaper, *The Hill* and more recently the must-read political daily, *Politico*. His most recent book, coauthored with his wife Susan J. Tolchin, is *Pinstripe Patronage: Political Favoritism from the Club House to the White House and Beyond* (2010). The Tolchins are coauthors of numerous other books including *Clout: Womanpower and Politics* (1974); *Dismantling America: The Rus to Deregulate* (1985); *A World Ignited: How Apostles of Ethnic, Religious and Racial Hatred Torch the Globe* (2006); and *Glass Houses: Congressional Ethics and the Politics of Venom* (2008). Tolchin has won many journalism awards including the Everett M. Dirksen Prize for Distinguished Reporting of Congress.

Susan J. Tolchin is University Professor of Public Policy at George Mason University. She is author of *The Angry American: How Voter Rage is Changing the Nation* (1996), and *Women in the U.S. Congress* (1976). In addition, she has coauthored eight books with her husband, Martin Tolchin (see above). She was elected fellow and board member of the National Academy of Public Administration, and received the Marshall Dimock Award from the American Society of Public Administration for the best lead article in *Public Administration Review* in 1996. She earned a Ph.D. from New York University, an M.A. from the University of Chicago, and a B.A. from Bryn Mawr College.

Lynn C. Ross is visiting assistant professor at Georgetown University where she is director of practica for the M.A. in American Government Program of the Georgetown Public Policy Institute. She also teaches executive branch politics and policymaking for Georgetown's Government Department. Prior to returning to academia, she worked for nearly 15 years for the U.S. government, including stints in the Executive Office of the President at the Office of Management and Budget, the Office of Personnel Management, the Department of Defense and Department of Health and Human Resources. She has received more than a dozen professional awards in government for outstanding service and special achievement. She has also served as a staff member of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee. She earned a B.A. degree from the state University of New York at Binghamton, an M.A. in Public Administration from the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University, and a Ph.D. in American Government from Georgetown University.
